
WHO DO I REPRESENT?





PRODUCING ENERGY AND PROTECTING THE ENVIRONMENT



Celebrating the work of the Citizens Climate Lobby in West Chester.

A bipartisan group of lawmakers is making a last-minute pitch to House Agriculture Committee leaders to wrap into the 2025 farm bill more than two dozen bills aimed at addressing climate change without sacrificing economic prosperity.

In a letter Friday to House Agriculture Chair Glenn Thompson (R-Pa.) and ranking Democrat David Scott of Georgia, Reps. Chrissy Houlahan (D-Pa.) and Andrew Garbarino (R-N.Y.) said "durable, bipartisan legislation is the best way to achieve our shared goals" including promoting resilient farming practices, expanded research and diverse rural energy. The two lawmakers chair the House Climate Solutions Caucus.

The bills they promoted are all bipartisan and touch on a wide range of agricultural and forest policies, from boosting climate-related research to expanding crop insurance into damage caused by wildfire smoke, to halting the spread of the cropdamaging spotted lanternfly.

In March 2024, we honored the heroism of our constituent, Larry Liss, with the Silver Star. It is the third highest military commendation and awarded for valor in battle.



Houlahan Votes to Keep Government Open

Calls for a return to bipartisan negotiations in the new Congress

WASHINGTON, D.C. – Today, Representative Chrissy Houlahan (D-PA), shared the following statement on her vote for the American Relief Act of 2025:

"This evening, I voted in favor of the continuing resolution to fund our government and keep vital public services operating through March 2025. This bill provides needed funding to communities to recover from natural disasters, extends authorities used to detect and monitor drone activity, provides essential funding for telehealth access and community health centers, and extends the farm bill. It also prevents 66,000 federal workers in Pennsylvania from being involuntarily furloughed right before the holidays.

"We know that legislating can be messy so while I'm frustrated, I'm not terribly surprised that we went beyond the eleventh hour to figure this out. What is alarming, and unprecedented, is the extent to which one man, Elon Musk, who wasn't elected and has no official government role was able to torpedo a bipartisan agreement while using his extraordinary wealth to threaten and bully members. Democrats have, once again, been the adults in the room here in Washington – we have compromised with our votes and provided for the needs of the people, not the elite.

The House Budget Committee adopted a budget resolution Thursday as GOP leaders work to unlock the power to enact major Republican priorities along party lines.



BY THE NUMBERS

How much legislation actually passed in the 118th Congress?

If measured by the number of bills signed into law, the 118th Congress was the most unproductive in 40 years:

- The 118th Congress successfully passed less than 150 bills.
- For comparison, the 117th Congress passed more than 350 bills when Democrats held control of both chambers and the White House.
- Since 1989 when George H.W. Bush was president each previous Congress passed an average of more than 380 laws.

How many of the bills from the 118th Congress were about renaming post offices or other non-critical issues?


• Approximately half of total legislation (more than 70) in the 118th Congress.

• Hundreds of bills related to kitchen table issues! We introduced around 9,000 bills as a Congress including legislation about healthcare, education, immigration, etc.
